New charter school to open in temporary location

Anchorage School District's newest charter school, Alaska Native Cultural Charter School, will begin the year at Muldoon Community Assembly, 7041 DeBarr Road until renovations to the school's permanent location on Muldoon Road are finished.

ANCCS is open to all students in grades K-6. The school will incorporate active engagement with the Alaska Native community, offer students a curriculum focused on Alaska Native culture and a rigorous academic program that enhances academic achievement. In order to enroll in ANCCS, students must complete necessary paperwork for the August 8 lottery.

A Word from Carol Comeau, Superintendent

In 1974, gasoline prices were less than 50 cents per gallon, car seats weren't required for young children's safety and smoking cigarettes was not only accepted, it was the hip thing to do for many.

It was then, 34 years ago, that I began my career in the Anchorage School District. A lot has changed over the years, much of it for the better.

Our schools are exponentially more diverse. We are not only more accepting of differences in others but embracing and learning from them. The diverse student population in Anchorage has grown from around 13 percent to 50 percent with more than 85 languages spoken by ASD students.

Our students are also diverse when it comes to their standards of living. More students than ever qualify for free or reduced price lunch, meaning their household income is low enough that the federal government supplements their meals. Families are struggling to get by yet they hold value in a good education and work hard to make sure their children come to school ready to learn.

Technology, a word rarely used in everyday vocabulary three decades ago, has transformed from pocket calculators to a medium that we can't seem to live without. Teachers across the district are integrating technology into lesson plans to increase student achievement and learning in ways that engage today's students.

In 1974, ASD had 55 schools, today there are nearly 100 and dozens more specialized programs. With all that has changed in the Anchorage School District, one thing that remains constant is our dedication to students. Our staff members truly believe their job is the district's mission: **to educate all students for success in life.**

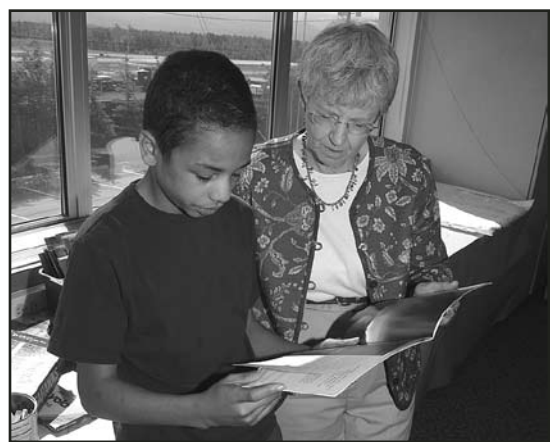
Next Friday, the district will release its Adequate Yearly Progress results, as determined by the federal No Child Left Behind Act. The calculations to determine the results are very complex yet some in this community tend to oversimplify the results and rush to judgment by labeling our schools as failures if they don't meet AYP guidelines. However, these results are only one set of data that is used to track student progress. We will provide more information on our results on our Web site at www.asdk12.org and in the Anchorage Daily News on Saturday, August 9.

I can honestly and proudly say that our students are getting a good education. Our 2007 high school graduates were offered more than \$35 million in college scholarships, more students are taking and passing Advanced Placement and other rigorous courses, our college entrance exams continue to rank above the national average and our students are nationally recognized for their knowledge and skills. In addition, many of our graduates have entered military service or have found positions in apprenticeship or other training programs as a result of our outstanding program at the King Career Center and our Anchorage Construction Academy.

Schools progress because our teachers are talented and they're supported by dedicated staff and families who take an active role in our children's education. Lives may be more intricate and fast-paced than they were when I began in this district, but one thing remains constant: **our children are our future.** As we begin this new school year, I ask all parents and community members to partner with us to make this a year to remember for continued student success. I thank you for your continuing support for the Anchorage School District.

The Anchorage School District provides free and reduced-price meals for elementary, middle, and high school students. Under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program, the household size and income criteria listed below are used to determine eligibility for the 2008-09 school year. This income chart is adjusted each year by the federal government.

Free and reduced-price meals for students

Who is eligible

Children from households whose size and income is at or below the criteria are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals for the school year effective July 1, 2008 – June 30, 2009. Income plus Permanent Fund Dividend information will be totaled.

A household or family is defined as a group of related or unrelated individuals who are living as one economic unit.

Children who are members of households that are approved for Food Stamps or Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP), or Temporary Assistance to Native Families (TANF) are automatically eligible for free meals.

Foster children, as the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court, may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the household income where they reside.

How to apply

Applications must be submitted annually

If your children participated in the free and reduced-price meal program last year, you have a 30-day (30 school days) carryover period this school year. Your children's eligibility will end on the 31st school day if you have not submitted a new application for the current school year. To avoid confusion and disruption of your students' benefits, please apply early.

Applications will be distributed to all elementary, middle and high schools at registration, and will be available at the schools, ASD Education Center, and Student Nutrition Dept. Applications are also available online at www.asdk12.org. Click on "menus" under the Parents/Students section.

Instructions for applying are on the back of the application. More details are available on a separate question/answer sheet. Please submit one application per family. Processing time is 10 working days. Parents **must be responsible** for their child(rens') meals until notified by letter, which is **sent to the address of registration**.

Applications must be complete to be eligible for processing. Incomplete applications **must** be returned. Information on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and use in Title I grants. Applications may be verified at any time during the school year.

Special message for Food Stamp (ATAP), (TANF), migrant applicants

Student Nutrition now receives automatic electronic data import for the households who normally receive the Food Stamp/Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP), (TANF) School Meal Direct Certification notices from Division of Public Assistance. Student Nutrition then sends letters advising households of their child(rens') status. Any eligible household, not advised through the electronic import process, and who have written certification from Public Assistance, may submit same as a meal application or use a regular application listing their case number. Electronic imports are also received from Migrant Education and families advised of their status.

Transferring schools

Some district schools may be designated to a special category which allows the schools to feed all students free without applications. However, if students from such schools should transfer within this district to regular schools that participate in the Free and Reduced-price Meal Program with applications, then *the transfer student must have* an application at that time if they want to be considered for the program from that point forward. Otherwise, it is not necessary to complete a new application when transferring between regular district schools. Schools where students are automatically fed free are: Fairview, Mt. Iliamna, Mt. View, Muldoon, North Star, Whaley, William Tyson and Williwaw elementaries.

Reapplication

You may apply for benefits anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a change, such as decrease in household income, (send written verification of same), an increase in household size, become unemployed or start to receive Food Stamps or Alaska Temporary Assistance for your children, complete a new application.

Educational needs of children with disabilities

Special education means the specifically designed instruction, at no cost to the parents, to meet the unique needs of a child with a disability. Specially designed instruction means adapting content, methodology, or delivery of instruction to address the unique needs of the child and to ensure access of the child to the general curriculum. Special education is a service, not a place.

Eligibility for Special Education services

Two federal laws protect children with disabilities, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and Section 504 of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (IDEA) of 1973. Children experiencing disabilities are guaranteed a free appropriate public education (FAPE) under IDEA and Alaska State Regulations. Under IDEA, a child with a disability is one who has a physical or mental disability as defined in one of 14 eligibility categories, the disability adversely affects the educational performance of the child and because of the disability the child is in need of special education and related services. The areas of eligibility are autism, deafness, deaf blindness, early childhood developmental delay, emotional disturbance, hearing impairment, specific learning disability, mental retardation, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, and visual impairment. Section 504 defines disabled as "any person who has a physical or mental disability which substantially limits a major life activity or has a record of such a disability or is regarded as having such a disability." For information about whether your child may qualify for services under IDEA or Section 504, contact an administrator at your child's school.

Rights of children with disabilities

IDEA provides for a Free Appropriate Public Education to all children experiencing disabilities in the least restrictive environment. This means services without charge to the parent, in conformity with an appropriately developed Individualized Education Program (IEP), provided at public expense under public supervision, and which meet the education standards and administrative policies and procedures of the state education agency. IDEA requires school districts to provide parents with opportunities to become involved in their child's educational program and to document that involvement. These rights place responsibility on the parent to become actively involved. Rights to which parents are entitled under IDEA are referred to as procedural safeguards. A copy of the procedural safeguards

is available at any school or through the ASD Web site at www.asdk12.org/forms/uploads/procedural-safeguards.pdf.

Services available to children with disabilities

The Anchorage School District provides comprehensive educational services through the Special Education Department to all children who experience disabilities and have additional needs beyond those which can generally be met by the regular classroom program. Special education services are provided in all ASD schools, including alternative schools, optional schools, charter schools and special school programs. Services are designed by an IEP team in the least restrictive environment, including the parent as a contributing member. IDEA requires that a continuum of special education placements is available which includes support in the regular classroom supervised by special education personnel, direct service by special education personnel in the regular classroom, pull-out time from the regular classroom with service from special education personnel, self-contained special education classrooms, a special school, home or hospital instruction, or instruction in an institution. Since all components of the continuum cannot be provided in every neighborhood school, the IEP teams make every effort to provide the appropriate services for a student in a setting as close to his/her normal classroom as possible. In addition to providing the necessary special education services, the IEP team may determine a need for related services. Related services may include speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, counseling, specialized nursing services, audiology services and transportation.

Confidentiality protections

The district maintains the confidentiality of information relating to students with disabilities. The district must obtain written consent before disclosing personally identifiable information to any person other than a school employee who has a legitimate educational interest, employees of the school in which the child is enrolled, or a representative of the United States Department of Education or the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development.

New-to-District Students

To complete registration, new-to-district students will need:

- Current official record of immunization for diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus – also known as D-P-T – and polio, measles, mumps, rubella, hepatitis A and hepatitis B on or before August 20.
- All children attending a preschool are required to register and be immunized against Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) and varicella or have a history of varicella disease (chicken pox). Students will be allowed to select courses but will not be allowed to attend classes until the immunization record is on file in the school. Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) boosters must be current (within the last 10 years).
- Birth certificate for kindergarten and first-grade students.
- Kindergarten students need to present a physical examination statement completed by a licensed physician, physician's assistant, or state authorized advanced nurse practitioner within 12 months prior to entry into kindergarten or within 90 days after entry into kindergarten.
- All students transferring into the district will receive a health screening by a school nurse within 90 days, to meet the physical examination requirement.

- Estudiantes Recién Llegados al Distrito Escolar**
Estudiantes recién llegados al distrito escolar deben de tener:
 - Para todos los estudiantes nuevos en el Distrito Escolar de Anchorage es exigido el registro o record de las siguientes vacunas: Difteria, tosferina y tétano, también conocidas como D-P-T, poliomielitits, sarampión, papearas, rubéola, hepatitis A, hepatitis B. Dos dosis de la vacuna del sarampión son exigidas para los estudiantes nuevos. Estas deberán presentarse antes o el 20 de agosto.
 - Se requiere que todos los niños que asistan a la escuela pre-primaria sean vacunados contra la Haemophilus Influenzae (gripe) Tipo B (Hib) y la viruela (chicken pox) o que Tengan un historial de Viruela.
 - Los estudiantes pueden elegir o seleccionar cursos pero no pueden asistir a clases hasta que la escuela no obtenga una copia oficial de las vacunas.
 - Certificado de nacimiento para el kinder y primer grado.
 - Los estudiantes de kinder necesitan un examen físico de salud hecho por un médico/doctor, o por un asistente médico, o por una enfermera/enfermero práctico autorizado por el estado. Este certificado debe de estar vigente dentro de los 12 meses antes del estudiante entrar al kinder ó 90 días después de entrar a la escuela.
 - Todos los estudiantes transferidos dentro del distrito escolar se les dará un chequeo de salud por una enfermera o enfermero certificado por el estado dentro de los 90 días de su transferencia.

Mga Bagong Mag-aaral sa Purok ng Paaralang Anchorage (Anchorage School District)

- Upang makumpleto ang pagpapalista ng mga magsisipag-aaral sa ASD ay kinakailangang:
 - May kasalukuyang rekord ng bakuna (immunization record) ng diphteryang, pertussis at tetanus-kilala rin sa tawag na D.P.T., polyo, tigidas, rubella, hepatitis A at hepatitis B sa o bago mag-ika 20 ng Agosto. Dalawang dosis ng bakuna sa tigidas ang kailangan.

 - 유이월(프리스톨)에 다니는 모든 아동은 아동은(Hib)과 수두(벨리셀라) 예방 접종이나 수두를 앓은 경우 그 기록이 필요합니다.
 - 예방 접종 기록이 학교 무실에 제출되기 전까지는 학부모 선택은 허락되지만, 학교 출석은 허용되지 않습니다.
 - 유치원생(킨디가던)과 1 학년생은 출생 증명서가 요구 됩니다.
 - 유치원생들은 입학 전 12개월 이내나 입학 후 90일 이내에, 인가 받은 의사 보조 또는 주정 상급 간호사가 발급한 신체 검사 증명서를 제출해야 합니다.
 - 앵커리지 교육청 산하로 진학 오는 학생들은 90일 이내에 유자격 학교 교사사로 부터 건강 검진을 받게 됩니다.

Parents must take official shot records to school registration for new-to-district students and to update school health records if new shots were given during the summer. Immunization exemptions may be granted for medical or religious reasons.

The number of vaccine doses for each required immunization varies depending upon a child's age, grade and prior vaccination history. Please take your child's shot records with you to determine if vaccination is needed. Childhood vaccines are available at physician offices, clinics, and public health centers throughout the community. Immunizations are available at the following locations at no cost.

Busing

District students who live more than 1.5 miles from their school, or who live along routes designated as hazardous for walking, are eligible to ride a school bus. Students who live less than 1.5 miles from school walk or arrange alternate transportation.

All students must pass the Alaska High School Graduation Qualifying Exams (reading, writing and math) prior to receiving a diploma, as well as fulfill ASD graduation requirements.

Student Fees

Non-resident Tuition
By state law, all non-resident students attending schools of this district shall pay, *in advance*, the regular school tuition rate (AS 9.030). This law pertains to students whose parents are not residents of the Municipality of Anchorage and who are not in the custody of a district resident (ASD Policy Section 431.21). For more information about non-resident tuition, please contact the school principal.

Student Parking
Students driving to school and parking on school grounds must register with the school office to obtain a parking permit. Vehicles parked on school grounds without parking permits are subject to fines and may be towed at the expense of the owner of the vehicle. The cost of the permit is \$50 per semester. Permits will be available at registration.

Neighborhood Schools

The neighborhood schools in Anchorage offer a top quality and well-rounded standard school education program. Over 90 percent of Anchorage School District students enjoy the

comprehensive curriculum in the neighborhood schools. The district's curriculum emphasizes the basic communication skills of reading, writing, speaking and listening. Students are schooled in mathematics, how to use a library and how to use and understand technology as a tool for learning and working. The standard program also includes social studies, health, science, physical education, art and music. Remedial and advanced classes are available in a variety of subjects.

Open Enrollment Policy

The Anchorage School District will continue with the limited open enrollment policy for students who wish to attend a school or program outside their regular attendance area for the 2008–09 school year. Gender and grade balances will be considered. No zone exemptions will be given for schools that have changed boundaries during the first year new boundaries are in effect.

Application Procedures

- Complete an Attendance Zone Exception Application available from any school principal.
- If applicants outnumber openings, a lottery determines a waiting list from which students enter the program when space becomes available. Most ASD schools are over capacity at this time. Two lotteries are held annually if needed. The next lottery will be held August 8. Lottery applications must be submitted by the close of school business hours on August 7. Applications should be submitted to the administrator in charge of the individual school program. For more information please call 742-4321.

Part-time Students

Students enrolled in correspondence, private or home school who wish to enroll part time (three classes or less) should contact district schools for an application form and register at the same time as district students.

Alternatives and Specialized Programs

In addition to the standard school program, the district offers many alternative schools and programs. Other programs such as Bilingual, Gifted and Special Education, for which students are referred by teachers and other staff based on student assessment, are also available.

AVAIL
Alternative Vocational Academic Institute of Learning (AVAIL) is an alternative program for students who have dropped out of high school. This program emphasizes development of self-esteem, pre-employment skills and remedial academic education. Call 742-4930 for more information.

Benny Benson/SEARCH
Benny Benson Secondary School is for middle and high school students who have not experienced success in the standard school setting. Benson has a strict discipline policy and firm requirements for regular attendance, good behavior and consistent academic performance. Individual learning concerns are taken into account. Students in grades 10-12 attend school half of the day and are required to have a part-time job or attend a vocational class at the King Career Center for the other half of the day. Central Middle School of Science
This school houses an alternative program with a math/science emphasis. Call 742-5100 for more information.

Charter Schools
Charter schools are non-sectarian, public schools that operate within the district under contract with the School Board. Any person, group or organization may apply to the School Board to operate a charter school. Charter schools offer alternative teaching methods or curriculum and more independence than regular public schools, and set their own calendars.

Continuation School
The Continuation School is an individualized, computer-based instructional program for middle and high school students expelled from the Anchorage School District for violations of school policy. The program provides students with core academic instruction designed to meet the requirements for promotion to the next grade level and progress towards graduation. The program allows a student to continue to receive academic instruction while he or she is completing requirements for reinstatement into the school district. Creating Optimal High School Opportunities (COHO)
COHO primarily suites the needs of students who are behind in credit, who are not successful in their current educational setting or who need a different approach to learning. Students earn credits through online learning programs. Teachers are available to assist students who need direct one-on-one instruction, supplemental materials and course review. The program is self-paced and works best for students who are self

motivated. Elective credit may also be earned through work experience. Students attend one half-day session and are expected to continue their work at home for additional time during the day. For more information, call COHO at 742-3028.

Release of Personal Info and Process for Opting Out

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act allows the district to publicly release “directory information” about students that would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. Directory information includes: student name, address, date and place of birth, dates of attendance, grade level, degrees and awards received, date of graduation, name of secondary school most recently attended, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, and height and weight of members of interscholastic athletic teams.

School officials may release directory information about a student without first obtaining parental consent, unless parents object by completing a directory information “Opt Out” form, which is available on the ASD Web site and at each school.
In two instances, the district is required by law to release certain contact information regarding 11th-grade and 12th-grade students, unless parents object. First, the district is required to provide to the **University of Alaska** the names and addresses of those students eligible for UA scholarship programs. Second, upon receiving a request from **military recruiters** and/or institutions of higher learning, the district must provide students' names, addresses, and telephone numbers.

Parents who object to the release of their students' telephone numbers and directory information to military recruiters and colleges should complete a directory information “Opt Out” form.

Parents who have no objections to the release of directory information do not need to take any action.

Activities

Fees
The middle school activity fee is \$80 per sport. The high school fee is \$160 per sport. A family cap will be implemented once the students in a family have paid \$330 to participate in any combination of middle and high school activities.

Middle School
Middle school students may participate in interscholastic and intramural athletics and a variety of academic and recreational activities. Students who would like to participate in interscholastic and intramural sports must:

- be enrolled as a full-time student in the Anchorage School District (4 or more classes).
- have an Activity Participation form signed by a parent/guardian for each sport.
- have a current sports physical on file with the school; this exam is good for one year from date of issue.

In addition students who participate in interscholastic sports must pay the \$80 participation fee per sport, be eligible for a sports fee waiver, or meet the family cap for middle school and high school sports fees.

In order to practice or play in a game, a student must be in attendance at school a minimum of one-half day, except for extenuating circumstances (such as a school field trip) approved by an administrator.

High School
To be eligible to participate in Alaska School Activities Association sanctioned activities, a student must:

- pay the \$160 activity fee per sport, or apply for a fee waiver based on hardship through the school activity office, or meet the family cap for middle or high school activity fees.
- be enrolled in the ASD for five or more courses during the grading period the activities are offered.
- have passed five or more courses during the grading period immediately prior to the activities.
- earn a 2.0 GPA during the previous grading period.
- meet the ASAA semester credit rules and transfer of eligibility rules.

 Students who want to participate in athletics, cheerleading or other strenuous activities must have a physical examination form on file at the school. This exam is good for one year but must not expire during the season of the sport in which the student is participating. Specific activities may have additional requirements.
